X. APPLICATION REVIEW

WIN10-09 Restoring Coastal Dunes to Learn the Effects of Invasive Iceplant on Insects and Other Anthropods

The biodiversity and ecological functioning of rare coastal dunes at Coal Oil Point Reserve are threatened by invasive iceplant. This invasion is likely impacting the native community of arthropods, which are an essential component of the food web and are vital to proper ecosystem functioning. Habitat will be restored in experimental plots where the effects of iceplant invasion and habitat restoration on native arthropod assemblages are investigated. Local volunteers and an undergraduate intern will participate in the effort, promoting ecological appreciation and providing career experience. This comprehensive study will repair habitat while improving restoration techniques and increasing ecological understanding.

MOTION to fund WIN10-09 \$6,040

STIPULATION: There will be 2 interns for 2 quarters for \$1,200 rather than the proposed \$1,660 hourly compensation for one intern. Coastal Service Program will provide Denise with support for weekend restoration efforts, and all future posters, banners, etc related to this project have the CF logo

WIN10-03 Lagoon Breaching in Santa Barbara

The research objective of this study is to investigate the interactions of watershed hydrology, lagoon geomorphology and hydrology, and tidal levels in controlling the breaching of lagoons in Santa Barbara County. Lagoon breaching is a geomorphic

process that affects the survival of steelhead trout, one of the most endangered species on earth, and the endangered tidewater goby. Lagoon breaching is one of the main determinants of lagoon habitat quality because it strongly controls the water quality within the lagoon, and controls migration from the ocean to streams.

MOTION to fund WIN10-03 for four Solinist totaling \$1580, one Barotroll for \$395, one docking station for \$300, and 4 Piezometers for \$320 and also excludes funding for transportation.

WIN10-06 Coastal Wild Heritage Project

The Coastal Wild Heritage Project is a new effort to permanently preserve more than 20,000 acres in the Santa Ynez Mountains above UCSB, from Ellwood Canyon to Refugio Pass. The lands are part of the Los Padres National Forest. The project seeks to add these lands to the National Wilderness Preservation System, the country's highest level of land protection. Doing so will permanently protect the upper watersheds of coastal creeks that directly impact the UCSB shoreline and surrounding areas.

MOTION to fund WIN10-06 for 3 student interns, printing, website design and maintenance, for a total of \$6,800.00. Funding excludes the GIS software and Field Expenses.
