II. Sensitivity to The Needs of Students with Disabilities Several weeks ago, a student had an experience which needs to be addressed.

A professor announced to the entire class, "I need to find out what I am going to do with this hardworking disabled student. I need to figure out how she will participate in this assignment." This is clearly a breach of confidentiality as it is not appropriate for faculty members to mention a student's disability in the classroom. This is an issue that we will

address with the Disabled Students Program and the professor to ensure that

it does not happen again. (Perhaps some sensitivity training within each department would help.) Another incident occurred to said student today when

test accommodations were requested. Being visually impaired, the student normally takes blank procter forms to the professor and fills them out at the time of the procter request. However, one of the professors flatly said, "I can't sign this until you fill it out. Have someone help you fill

this out and bring it back to me on Thursday." Although this was not a direct breach of any formal rules, the professor could have taken thirty seconds to assist the student with the paperwork. A question as to whether

it would be possible for DSP to preprint information such as student's name

and contact information on procter forms was discussed. This could be one of the measures taken to prevent similar incidents from occurring again.
