

The Pearman Fellowship is an Associated Students program designed to increase engagement with AS through fostering understanding of how AS operates and having students get involved with facilitating change through their respective entity

History of the Fellowship

The Pearman Fellowship initially started as the AS Fellowship Program during the 2013/2014 school year.

The Fellowship is named after Kelly Pearman, a UCSB Alumna who passed at age 22. She was involved heavily in the Gaucho community and was a bright light within UCSB Associated Students.

Over the years, the Pearman Fellowship has given students many access points in how to get involved in Associated Students and has become a program where many Gauchos can identify their voice in a scaled way.




What is Associated Students?


- Funded as a non-profit entity and a student union for all undergraduates (funded by student fees)



Duties:

The Associated Students Office of the President Staff (ASOP) is empowered to assist the A.S. President in the execution of their presidential duties. The President's office is the central point of communication between UCSB students and administration. Our job is to represent student concerns in areas including arts and culture, mental health, alumni affairs, environmental sustainability, basic needs, and more. Our core mission is to ensure that we are properly allocating student fees to organizations and projects throughout AS that can enhance the educational and overall experience of student life at UCSB.

Projects:

- 1) Assisting with the EVPSA's efforts in UCSA's campaigns to:
 - a) Increase access to paid fellowships for undocumented students.
 - b) Secure greater resources for disabled students.
 - c) Advocate for UC divestment from the Thirty Meter Telescope Project.
 - d) Register UCSB students to vote.
 - e) Improve affordability and access to financial aid for marginalized students.
 - f) Attending lobby meetings with the EVPSA legislative department.

Duties

- The fellows would help with advertising events as well as assisting office members on any projects they are working on.
- The fellows would be helping with open markets, advocacy issues, and other community events.
- Planning major events throughout the year, and assisting in halloween weekend and Deltopia preparation
- Assisting in issues related to housing and food insecurity, community safety and policing

Duties

- Assist in all matters requested by the Student Advocate General regarding advocacy or outreach
- Organizing with organizations/devising policy changes that work to support the Associated Students Bill of Rights
- Be responsible for projects and outreach that focus on advocacy and upholding student rights

What does the legislative branch do? Who are our elected senators?







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Legislative Branch

 Associated Students Senate: elected representatives that serve as the policy-making body of Associated Students



- Address student needs and provide resources that enhance the student experience at UCSB
- Hold authority over all Associated Students revenue and expenditure
- Approve the annual \$14 MILLION budget each year



 Serve as liaisons to BCUs, attend meetings that correspond with their positions, participate in Senate group projects, and hold public forums

Senate Fellowship-Office of Senate Leadership

Duties

- 1. Oversee all Senate Standing, Administrative, and Temporary Committees and check-in with Chairs and Vice-Chairs of each committee to ensure completion of tasks.
- 2. Work under the Internal Vice-President to lead the Senate and provide guidance/ assistance to all senators on legislation, HIPs, group projects, and other tasks.
- 3. Create and track progress on the Annual Senate Strategic Vision Plan created by the Senate Executive Committee each term to set concrete, time-based, practical goals for each Senate Committee to complete by the end of their term.
- 4. Follow-up on all Action Items passed by the Senate each meeting and ensure business is properly completed.
- 5. Both Senate Pro-Tempores are responsible for attending all meetings of the Office of the Internal Vice President and working with the IVP to prepare for Senate meetings by determining meeting logistics such as: food provided, technology, order of the agenda, livestreaming capabilities, and more. Members of the Office of Senate Leadership may share or complete some of these responsibilities with the consent of the IVP.
- 6. Responsible for formulating the annual budget packet for the Associations \$19 Million budget and presenting to the Finance Committee during the budget allocation hearings.
- 7. Will ensure through organization, management, delegation, and administrative work—that the Senate is able to function within all of its enumerated constitutional responsibilities.

Potential Projects

- Infrastructure Reform & Campus Beautification: comprehensive list of campus and IV
 infrastructure improvements that need to be made including bike paths, street lights, and more.
 Play with lock-in-fees to achieve this (IV Improvements, bike paths, parking, etc.)
- 2. NARCAN IN ALL UNIVERSITY DORMS W/COSWB & Gauchos for Recovery
- 3. REFLECTION ROOM PERMANENT SPACE W/MSA
- 4. ISLA VISTA EMERGENCY COMMUNICATION TOWERS W/EVPLA
- 5. Full Digitization of the Association by the end of our term (MIP accounting platform, accounting rework act, data management system, etc)
- 6. Comprehensive Financial Reform (reform lock-in-fee ballot language, move \$ between accounts, find a new bank to replace Montecito Bank & Trust, find a way to implement direct ADP for honoraria).

The Office of Senate Leadership was created last year by the former Pro-Tempores and currently consists of the First Senate President Pro-Tempore, the Second Senate President Pro-Tempore, and a Head of Staff for each Pro-Tempore. Main tasks would include administrative tasks like replying to emails, updating the Legislation and Appointment tracking spreadsheets, and attending different committee and BCU meetings on behalf of the Pro-Tempores if a scheduling conflict occurs. They could also potentially get the chance to proxy for either Pro-Tempore or other Senators during the year, making it the ideal stepping stone for any underclassmen who would want to run for Senate in the future!

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Judicial Branch

- Judicial Council: convenes to determine if Legal Code has been broken and decides sanctions
- Attorney General: responsible for prosecuting the conducting suits which are brought to the Judicial Council, and also give advice upon questions about Legal Code

Duties

Helping with cases and briefs

Projects

- Examining AS code
- Helping analyze case arguments, etc

**Judicial Council positions are lifetime appointments

"The UCSB Associated Students Judicial Council serves as the judicial branch of the student government and is empowered to hear and decide any cases under its legal jurisdiction as noted in Article VII of the AS Constitution. Included in this provision is the responsibility of the Council to adjudicate completely and diligently questions pertaining to the AS Legal Code, including, but not limited to, the By-Laws and policies of any AS entities including all AS Board and Committees, KCSB, and all AS Business Services in order to render a just and equitable decision."



Office of the Attorney General | Eric Carlson


Duties:

- Fellows are expected to learn the innermost workings of the Association's rule book, all while exploring what the Association has to offer in a hands-on, custom-built approach to legal analysis.
 Fellows will have the opportunity to work with the AG in developing cases to present to the Judicial Council, the Association's version of the United States Supreme Court.
- By participating in the Attorney General's office, you will learn how legislation is written and passed, how our financial structure informs our decision making, and how policies adopted today shape the campus for generations later.

Prospective Projects:


 Prospective projects include legal code enhancement, event planning, and case litigation. The AG's office works closely with executives and legislators to make positive change on campus.

Elections Board

Mission: The Elections Board is tasked with managing our Associated Students, campus-wide elections. The task of this board is remain neutral throughout the election season.

Duties

- Responsible for attending weekly scheduled Board meetings
- Help a plan a Candidates' Forum and any other public activity to further aid the electorate in understanding ballot issues and Candidates' platforms
- Determine eligibility for those running for an elected position
- Enforce the Constitution and By-Laws in all aspects of eligibility for an elected position
- Help with our social medias/website/online presence or with enforcing regulations via any official election-related complaints received

A.S. Food Bank

Duties

 Assist the food bank and food bank committee in re-imagining the brand of the AS Food Bank. The outcomes of this fellowship would include an update to the ASFB logo, development of outreach strategy, create new strategies for brand awareness, and increasing involvement with the food bank committee.

Projects

All components of a re-branding and marketing proposal.

- Identifying strategies for deeper engagement
- Establish targeted audience research
- Develop a logo and any brand slogans
- Identify a collection of merchandise and staff uniforms
- Plan a brand awareness launch through targeted activities including social media platforms, giveaways, and brand materials.

Public & Mental Health Commission


Duties

- Shall act as a reference point for student social services related to public and mental health at UCSB.
- Shall maintain a proactive student voice and address Public Health and Mental Health concerns on campus and in Isla Vista.
- Shall work to educate the campus on issues pertaining to student public health and mental health.
- Shall create viable and effective communication between UCSB students and various campus departments focused on Healthcare, Public Health, and Mental Health at UCSB and in the UC system.
- Shall take direct action to expand and improve mental health services at UCSB and in the UC system.
- Shall take direct action to expand and improve healthcare availability at UCSB and in the UC system.
- Shall coordinate speakers, lectures, panels, and other events to educate and make UCSB or the community aware of issues.

The commission shall be in charge of the planning and funding of the annual UCSB Mental Health Conference. The commission shall host the monthly Student Health Advisory Committee meetings.

Potential Projects

 Reproductive Justice Program at Student Health, Harm Reduction Promotion in collaboration with Gauchos for Recovery, Mental Health Conference, Well-being Peer Program, Mental Health First Aid Trainings on campus



Public Safety Commission

Duties

- promoting a safe environment in Isla Vista and on the UCSB campus which involve collaborating with students, community members, public safety organizations, and local law enforcement authorities
- engage in work such as professional communication, event planning and logistics, social media and web management and exposure, and creative problem solving to benefit the safety and security of Isla Vista and UCSB and its students

Potential Projects

- Implementation of past survey information to create a Public Safety outlook plan during events such as Deltopia weekend
- Collaboration with Recreation Center instruction to provide CPR/AED, first aid, lifeguard training, etc. to students
- Data/information/opinion collection through surveying and other methods from students;
 dissemination of information in physical and other formats detailing available resources in the community pertinent to public safety
- public safety fair hosting agencies and organizations to promote awareness and communication; more unplanned projects.


